"From my meeting with Senator Sue West I gained an educated perspective about the history of women in the Australian parliament. During this meeting we discussed Senator West's career and her successes and the challenges of being a woman in politics and the power and influence women can have in government.

We discussed political inclination and ideology specifically knowing which political party you personally lean towards or want to be a politician for and clear reasons why. Senator West also encouraged me to develop a broad understanding of global politics so as to provide a depth to my understanding.

I was also privileged to meet with our local Mayor, Mathew Dickerson. Our discussion was wide ranging covering the role of mayor, the skills and responsibilities of that position and some history of the council. I was particularly interested in Mayor Dickerson's successful mayoral podcast and how it is an effective way to fulfil the crucial role of communicating with the Dubbo community. I gained a lot of useful advice and information which I will add to my research journal.

Mayor Dickerson also rounded his time off at Macquarie by meeting with our Year 10 cohort to unpack the skills he applies to both his podcasts. This was information keenly noted in the lead up to their innovative Podcast assessment. I thank Mayor Dickerson for his time with both me and Year 10!"

Macquarie Announces Purchase of Boarding Facility Vista Lodge

It was with great joy that Macquarie Anglican Grammar School announced the purchase of our Boarding facility, Vista Lodge, in Term 2.

Boarding began at Macquarie as a five-year trial, and after an extremely successful period, the decision has been made to purchase the facility and make Boarding an ongoing part of our wonderful community.

"When I was appointed Headmaster of Macquarie Anglican Grammar School, nine years ago, many members of the Dubbo community spoke with me about the need for Boarding in Dubbo. We opened in 2019 and with the support of families throughout the Central West of NSW, we have grown from the original group of four through to 46 in 2023 with 56 students in 2024 and a waiting list for the outgoing years. I would like to thank all who have been part of this journey with us," said Headmaster Mr Craig Mansour.

The mission as a school and for our Boarding program is to develop resilient young people who make a difference in the world within a high quality, affordable, Christ-centred education.

Macquarie Boarding is a home away from home for our students. Our smaller scale and family-focus allows for interaction and engagement across year groups, allowing the development of strong connections amongst peers and with Boarding and school staff.

Our Boarding House is located a short drive from our main campus and the Dubbo CBD. The unique, bush setting boasts extensive grassed areas and recreational facilities including pool, basketball/tennis court, two cricket nets, barbecue area and an oval. Our facilities see two students per room with share house and common kitchen, bathrooms and recreational spaces. Students engage in weekend sport and attend local events.

"We are so proud of the Macquarie Boarding community – their hard work, commitment and support has led to this day. We are also very thankful to The Anglican Schools Corporation for their support in the planning, the development and now the purchasing of Vista Lodge," said Mr Mansour.

In addition to the purchase of Vista Lodge, Macquarie is currently constructing a new classroom flexible learning building. This building will provide our community with more high-quality teaching and learning spaces.

FUTURE PROOFING OUR KIDS' MENTAL HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Since 2020, a selected number of our current Year 10 cohort has been involved in the Blackdog Future Proofing Study.

The Future Proofing Study aims to discover how we can use the devices in our pockets – smartphones – to deliver preventative mental health interventions on a large scale. Studies of this size are commonplace for cardiovascular and cancer research but have never been attempted before for the prevention of mental health problems.

This world-first trial aims to predict and prevent anxiety and depression in thousands of Australian students aged 13 to 18 years, making it the largest study of its kind in the field of mental health. There will be another follow up survey in 2024 as these students transition into their final years of high school.

4Rs actively shared in the classroom

The start of 2023 has seen continued positivity and action surrounding our Teaching and Learning Framework and the 4Rs.

s with the rollout of any new initiative, it is imperative that we continue to reflect and refine our practices and make adjustments along the way. As such, we transitioned our Framework to include four colours, and the four learning dispositions expanded further with the inclusion of 12 underlying competencies.

Throughout Term 1 our Learning Power staff team continued to strategise and support teachers and the community in strengthening their Learning Power muscles. Staff spent time in professional learning sessions to commence the year and worked as professional learning communities throughout each term researching, planning, and implementing the 4Rs in lessons across each week. We are now confidently enacting the 'ACT' phase of our Learning Power 2023 journey.

Throughout Term 2, it has been wonderful to witness the collegial sharing, both conversational and resource base. We have certainly seen the 4Rs actively shared in the classroom.

The HSIE Faculty in the Senior School commenced their journey with adjustments to their assessments. They actively focused students not only the outcomes, subject content and task, but also towards the learning muscle they would need to develop and strengthen to support their learning.

Our Kindergarten students regularly stretched their relational learning muscles and their developing skills were showcased when they worked in teams to build the tallest tower using blocks. The students worked together without arguing or dismissing anyone's ideas. At the end of the task they showcased not only their towers, but also their skills in collaboration, specifically turn-taking and sharing ideas.

Part of being resourceful is having the capability to make connections between past and previous learning. Our Year 9 students in Mathematics conveyed this skill when they taught each other how to solve problems involving scientific notation.

Our 4Rs reach even further than the students in our classroom, they extend to our parents and the broader school community. Kindergarten engaged in a relational experience where Aunty Beth and Lyndon came and shared their culture and knowledge. Our students were engaged and inspired as they connected their historical learning and understanding.

The transference of skills from the classroom to other situations conveys strength and development of our learning dispositions. Macquarie students are not only using the language of our Framework, but they are also able to put the words into action

Resilience is often used and seen as a 'buzz' word in our society, however, it is a key isposition for supporting students' success. Our parents also play a crucial role in the success of our Framework. The PDHPE Faculty was kind enough to share some ips for growing resilience skills with our families throughout Semester 1.

We are so proud of the efforts of our staff, students and community in embracing our Teaching and Learning Framework. We have made many positive steps throughout Semester 1 and look forward to growing our learning muscles as the year progresses.

Kindergarten

Our Kindergarten students have had an excellent Semester 1. Students have learned to read through our Sounds-Write program and have learned all initial sounds. The Sounds-Write portal has made learning super fun and we enjoy using the interactive whiteboard to help us with our blending and segmenting of words. Reading groups have helped our students to further cement this knowledge with regular one-on-one reading and hands-on activities using Play-Doh, kinetic sand, stamping and shaving cream. Students also use this opportunity to improve their technology skills on the iPads.

Mathematics has seen us learn all about whole numbers, particularly numbers zero to 20. We have learned about addition and subtraction, number words. patterns, time, length, position and fractions. Again, students have really enjoyed an array of experiences using concrete hands-on materials daily, making use of outside classroom spaces and even using chalk to write numbers. Students in Kindergarten have challenged themselves this semester!

We have thoroughly enjoyed Creative Arts, particularly Dance and Drama. We have learned how to move our bodies in different ways and worked hard to learn and perform a dance for the Dubbo Eisteddfod! Kindergarten students walked away with first place and were super proud of themselves. In Science, students have worked with Mrs Job and have begun to familiarise themselves with Future Problem Solving. They have engaged in weekly experiments and STEM learning experiences. The skills taught in the Sounds-Write program are transferable, meaning our students can apply their knowledge to read and spell unfamiliar words.

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Say this phrase to our Macquarie Junior School students and they will automatically point to the sounds as they segment and blend, confidently reading AND writing words!

Sounds-Write is a systematic phonics program that has helped our students become more confident and skilful readers and writers. Sounds-Write follows a carefully planned and structured approach to teaching phonics and progresses in a logical sequence, introducing sounds and spelling patterns gradually and building on previously learned knowledge. This approach helps our students to develop a solid foundation in phonics and ensures mastery of initial and extended code.

Our Junior School staff members are all trained in the Sounds-Write program and provide explicit instruction during our literacy sessions. This program teaches the relationship between sounds and letters – focusing on teaching the initial code sounds or phonemes, and their corresponding letter combinations or spellings (graphemes). Our students learn that letters represent sounds, and there can be multiple spellings of a sound, or same sound but different spellings.

Sounds-Write teaches both decoding (reading) and encoding (spelling) skills. Learners not only learn to read words by decoding the sounds and letters but also learn to spell words by encoding the sounds into appropriate letters. This dual focus provides a balance in our literacy program and supports our students to progress both reading and writing skills simultaneously.

The skills taught in the Sounds-Write program are transferable, meaning our students can apply their knowledge to read and spell unfamiliar words. By understanding the phonetic patterns and rules, learners can tackle new words they encounter in their reading and writing, even if they haven't encountered those specific words before.

Our Kindergarten to Year 2 students have engaged with the Sounds-Write program since its introduction to our classrooms in 2019. Kindergarten work on the initial code sounds, with Years 1 and 2 extending on this knowledge with the extended code and alternate spellings of sounds. This grounding allows our students to continue their learning of spelling patterns with the Spelling Mastery program from Years 3 to 6. Our students have enjoyed engaging with the new Sounds-Write interactive portal and iPad applications to support the classroom teaching of this program also.

MATHEMATICS

In 2023, students in Mathematics have been learning different skills and building on their prior knowledge to develop their resilience and resourcefulness while they are becoming better Mathematicians.

Year 7 students have enjoyed a wonderful transition to secondary school. Mr Marty has assisted his class to build a fractions number line to help them model information that they can use to solve problems.

Year 8 students have been building on their skills learned in Year 7, as well as some new topics. They have learned about Pythagoras' Theorem, which is a property of right-angled triangles used in many careers, especially in trades such as building and mechanics. Ms Barber's class made examples of various prisms, and built robots with these, and found the total volume of their robot.

In Year 9, students study different courses in Mathematics, each with common topics and some with extension topics in preparation for advanced courses in the senior years. A common topic that Year 9 students have studied is Trigonometry, which has been new to all students. Students have found this topic enjoyable as it has allowed students to see practical applications of what they are learning in class. They have also enjoyed learning about financial mathematics.

Year 10 students have been busy thinking about their options for Stage 6. All students, regardless of course choice, should be building effective study skills as this will serve them well as they move into Stage 6.

Year 11 Standard students have adjusted to the fast pace of the course, and have enjoyed building on their Stage 5 skills with some revision of content as well as new concepts.

Year 12 has almost come to the end of their time with us at Macquarie. Year 12 Standard 2 students have been applying their knowledge of Trigonometry to make their own clinometers, and are considering the accuracy of the measurements taken using this method. All Year 12 Mathematics courses have now completed their final assessment task, and are preparing for their Trial Exams and HSC.

Let's take a closer look at some of the recent endeavours undertaken by our Stage 6 HSIE students:

In Modern History, students have recently completed an individual research project that has allowed them to explore and analyse a historical event or person depicted in a film. This innovative approach to studying history gave students the freedom to research an area of their own interest and provided an opportunity to dive into captivating narratives and examine their historical accuracy.

Economics students have been engrossed in a modified version of the classic board game, Monopoly. This unique twist on the game incorporates rule changes that mirror real-world economic conditions, including the interplay between free market dynamics and government intervention. By participating in this modified Monopoly, students gained first-hand experience of how supply and demand fluctuations impact market equilibrium prices.

Meanwhile, in the Society and Culture discipline, students have been diligently working towards the completion of their Personal Interest Projects (PIPs) and coursework. This crucial phase in their HSC journey represents the culmination of their studies in this subject, where they have explored various aspects of society and culture through extensive research and analysis.
